<p>Dailey, Michael C.</p>	<p><b>LAST RITES FOR DAILEY TOUCHING</b></p> <p>Summary: Relatives, friends and others pay respects to a Klamath Falls soldier as he is buried with military honors.</p> <p>The Stars and Stripes blanketing the silver casket of U.S. Army Pfc. Michael C. Dailey Jr. shone brightly against the sun-dried amber grass in the Klamath Falls cemetery Tuesday. There, where a veneer of snow had just melted under the day's occasional sun, Dailey, 19, was buried with full military honors.</p> <p>While elsewhere around the country families and friends of Operation Desert Storm soldiers celebrated the safe return of their loved ones, the war poignantly came home to this Southern Oregon city.</p> <p>Three days after the cease-fire was declared with Iraq, Dailey became the fourth</p>

Oregonian to die in the war. While on perimeter guard duty in Southern Iraq on March 1, Dailey picked up an unexploded mine. It exploded. He died the following day.

A fifth Oregonian, a 22-year-old soldier from The Dalles, would die two days later when he stepped on a land mine in Kuwait.

Dailey's 19-year-old widow, Danell, clutched a beige Teddy Bear as she walked, hand-in-hand with the mother-in-law she had met only days earlier, into the First Presbyterian Church on Pine Street before the brief graveside service. The bear was a gift from her young husband, who married her three days before being shipped to the Persian Gulf.

Dailey's mother, Debra, cannot bring herself to watch the joyous reunions on television of returning service men and women with their families. But, said Nancy Zweifel, Dailey's next door neighbor in Malin, "She's real glad that the troops are coming home."

Here, where a downtown flag hung at half-staff Tuesday and yellow ribbons and flags flew, military pride runs deep. More than 450 people filled the church, among them, a small sea of blue-uniformed men and women from the Oregon Air National Guard's 114th Air Tactical Fighter Squadron based in Klamath Falls. Across the aisle sat Sixth Army brass from California. Women and men in camouflage uniforms and boots filled others pews. Army officers in gold-braided dress blues and standard issue green uniforms were scattered throughout the sanctuary.

John Rusth, commandant of the detachment and a friend of Dailey's father, Michael C. Dailey Sr., said the detachment had sent packages to the younger Dailey since he was deployed to Saudi Arabia in August.

"He was an all-American type kid who joined the Army because that's what he wanted to do," Rusth said.

The elder Dailey, 37 and a Vietnam veteran, was proud of his son's participation in the liberation of Kuwait, Rusth said.

In the church, friends and family members from as far away as South Carolina filled six pews and friends filled others. They came in jeans and cowboy hats and blue VFW jackets. They came with yellow ribbons and the names of their soldier sons on their jackets.

Many area residents came simply out of respect for the fallen soldier and his family.

"We just wanted to show our support for that poor family and everybody who went over there," said Ron Fredricks, a life insurance salesman in Klamath Falls, "and we didn't know how else to do it."

Dailey was, said Rev. John Braund, raised in typical Klamath Falls fashion -- with a love of the outdoors. He had a knack for snaring elusive fish in the challenging Rogue River and a vigorous love of life.

Reading a statement written by members of Dailey's unit, F Troop, 2nd Squadron, 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment at Fort Bliss, Texas, Army Capt. Paul F.Crandall said Dailey was first sent to defensive positions near the Saudi Arabian-Kuwaiti border.

With the onset of war, Dailey's unit pushed west and then north into Iraq.

At war's end, "The enemy lost one Iraqi army," he said, his voice choked with emotion. "The regiment had lost one soldier: Michael Dailey.

Later, Crandall stood beside Danell Dailey, still clutching the bear, as Michael Dailey's casket was carried silently up a gentle hill at Eternal Hills Memorial Gardens.

A moment before, as six pall bearers slid Dailey's casket from its hearse, four F-16A jet fighters flew low across the cemetery in tribute. Danell rose quickly to her feet and turned to watch the planes disappear over the hills to the south.

Without a word, the pall bearers made their way under the small cemetery canopy, and set the casket down before Dailey's family.

Staff Sgt. Steven W. Riedy, a member of B Company, 1st Battalion of the 82nd Cavalry (Mechanized) of the Oregon Army National Guard, softly directed a white-gloved salute.

Yards away, seven gunners loaded their weapons. "Ready, aim, fire," the officer in charge said three times.

The family could not hold back their tears.

To the north, a bugler played the first notes of "Taps." Behind the crowd, a second bugler answered with the same notes.

Now, one pall bearer's hand trembled slightly. A tear ran down the cheek of another.

Never raising his voice, Riedy ordered the folding of the flag that had draped Dailey's casket. Two other uniformed men, one the brother-in-law of Dailey's father, stood by, each holding a flag to their chest.

A gunner walked to the edge of the canopy without speaking and slipped three blank cartridges inside the coffin's flag before its edges were tucked in. Not in the military's protocol, that honor developed as the dead of the Vietnam War were buried.

Crandall took the flag with the cartridges and bent on one knee in front of Danell. In a soothing voice just above a whisper, he told her the colors were presented to her "as a token of appreciation for the service of your husband."

Then he stood before her and saluted, never wiping the tear from his eye. Turning, he took a second flag and repeated similar words to Debra Dailey.

Sgt. 1st Class Tim Morris took the flag he held, bent to his brother-in-law, Dailey Sr., and tried to speak. The words were few.

There was one prayer.

Family members were comforted in the bitter wind by friends and relatives, then each seemed to go their separate way.

"When you support the troops," said Jerry Mathias Jr., a paratrooper in Vietnam who drove 15 miles to attend the funeral of someone he didn't know, "you support them from when they're alive to when they pass away.

<p>Dalton , Alfonso Estevan</p>	<p>When Alfonso Estevan Dalton was a toddler, he told his family he was going to serve in the U.S. Army.</p> <p>His dream became a reality at age 21 when he became one of 500,000 U.S.</p>

	<p>soldiers deployed to the Persian Gulf, where he fought in Desert Storm against Iraqi forces that had invaded Kuwait.</p> <p>"He was born wanting to do it," his mother, Carmelita Vasquez, recalled. "Even when he was little, he could barely talk and he would march around with a broomstick, and I would ask him what he was doing. And he said, 'I sol-der.' "</p> <p>Mr. Dalton survived the Persian Gulf War. But the veteran, who was raised as a Sioux, died Feb. 7 from medical complications at his mother's home in Denver. He was 34.</p> <p>"I didn't want him in the military," Vasquez said. "I guess I just didn't want him to be away from me."</p> <p>Vasquez recalled that her son used any excuse he could come up with to enlist in the military.</p> <p>"He said he was fighting for home and apple pie and mother country, and he was fighting to keep us safe and all this other stuff," his mother said. "Then he'd say, 'Mom, I always wanted to do this, come on!' "</p> <p>Mr. Dalton's family remembers him as a kind and gentle warrior.</p> <p>"He was a giver person - I don't say giving; I call him a giver person," his mom said. "If there was an elderly person who needed wood and they couldn't afford it, Alfonso and other boys would go and chop wood for them. He did a lot of car repairs for the elderly and people who didn't have a lot of money, and he'd use his own supplies."</p> <p>Mr. Dalton was born in Denver on Dec. 15, 1969. His late father, Oscar Jealous of Him, was Sioux.</p> <p>Mr. Dalton attended Abraham Lincoln High School but did not graduate. He earned his general equivalency diploma and enlisted in the Army, where he was with the 82nd Combat Engineers.</p> <p>Before the start of Operation Desert Shield in 1990, Mr. Dalton was stationed in Bamberg, Germany. After his Persian Gulf tour and his discharge from the service Mr. Dalton returned to Colorado. He worked installing drain gutters with his father.</p> <p>"He used to bow hunt," his mom recalled. Daniel, Candace	<p><b>BOYNTON WOMAN DIES IN KUWAIT FAMILY MOURNS PRIVATE KILLED IN ROAD ACCIDENT</b></p> <p>Vicky Daniel worried when her daughter Candace went off to war carrying an M-60 machine gun. She breathed easier when her daughter started carrying food to prisoners of war.</p> <p>But the danger did not subside. On Tuesday, Pfc. Candace Daniel, 20, of Boynton Beach, was killed in an accident when her truck swerved to avoid a crater in the Kuwaiti desert.</p> <p>"She made it through bombings, shootings, POWs, and she gets killed in something as senseless as an accident," Vicky Daniel said.</p> <p>U.S. Army officials said Candace Daniel was driving a truck from the commissary with two passengers when the truck overturned. Daniel was dead on arrival at a medical evacuation site. The two passengers were treated for injuries.</p> <p>Daniel is the first woman soldier to be killed in the Middle East since mid-April, the Pentagon said. Two women soldiers died during Operation Desert Shield, and 11 died during Operation Desert Storm.</p> <p>Family members said they had hoped to join in the kind of homecoming celebrations that have taken place all over South Florida. Daniel, whose brigade was transferred from Germany, could have come home as early as this month.</p> <p>"We were just glad she made it through the worst," said her sister, Edwina Daniel. "We felt that the worst part of the war was over and we expected her to come home.</p> <p>"We were hoping that by the time she got ready to come home, they were still going to do the big welcomes. She even said by the time she got ready to come home, she hoped they would be honoring all the remaining soldiers."</p> <p>But the family knew there would be no celebration when her mother saw an Army officer waiting in front of her house on Wednesday morning. She knew</p>

	<p>his message, even before she saw his uniform.</p> <p>"He held open the front door and before a word was out of his mouth, I begged, 'No, no, no. You are not coming to tell me about my baby.' Then he told me she was killed in an accident."</p> <p>Vicky Daniel said she prayed all night that the Army was mistaken.</p> <p>"I prayed that my baby would call me and then they called me this morning and said they were sending the body. And I knew it wasn't a mistake."</p> <p>Candace left for war on Dec. 27. She was with the 92nd Military Police Company, 14th Military Police Brigade.</p> <p>Her last call to the family came three weeks ago during a quick stop in Saudi Arabia. She said when she came home she was eager to treat the entire family to a trip to Walt Disney World and planned on taking them all on a shopping spree.</p> <p>In her early letters she complained of the weather and loneliness. "I need a pick-me-up. I'm very tired and sometimes I only want to come home. But I keep thinking that God will help me make it through. I love you and God bless you."</p> <p>Her mother said her daughter was scared and homesick when she first entered Saudi Arabia, but she quickly gained confidence doing her job. "She qualified as a sharpshooter. SHILOH --- A Colombian-born soldier from Shiloh was killed Monday in Afghanistan when his Humvee hit a land mine and came under mortar fire.

Staff Sgt. Edwin H. Dazachacon, 38, was one of four soldiers killed in the attack, announced U.S. Rep. Jerry Costello, D-Belleville. Dazachacon was with the Army's 7th Special Forces Group based out of Fort Bragg, N.C.

Costello's son, Jerry Costello II, described Dazachacon as a brother Wednesday. The two met in 1991 when they were paratroopers in the 82nd Airborne Division during Desert Shield and Desert Storm.

"We formed a brotherhood as I think many people do in the military and especially going through combat together," Jerry Costello II said. "What I'll miss the most about him is just his friendship and companionship. We had an understanding of each other that I think only two people who have been through the circumstances of combat and war can understand."

Dazachacon moved from California to Shiloh in 1994 to be close to the Costellos. Costello said Dazachacon, who was not married and didn't have children, was like a second father to his three kids.

	<p>He helped Costello coach 12-year-old Jerry III's soccer team and he took Victoria, 11, to church and on shopping excursions. And he was godfather to Georgia Danielle, 7.</p> <p>"He came and went at all of our houses like he was a member of the family, and he actually was," Costello said.</p> <p>Costello said Dazachacon led an active lifestyle and enjoyed mountain biking and snow skiing. He was director of fleet operations for Southwestern Bell in St. Louis and joined the National Guard. Dazachacon spoke English, Spanish and Italian, Costello said, so when the Army called him about 18 months ago seeking linguists to aid in the war on terror, he re-enlisted. He had been in Afghanistan for about a month, Costello said.</p> <p>"Edwin died doing what he wanted to do. He loved his country, his family and our family. He was a dedicated soldier and a great person," Congressman Costello said in a written statement.</p> <p>The Army public affairs office would not confirm the four soldiers' deaths Wednesday, but military newspaper Stars and Stripes reported on its Web site that Dazachacon's unit was in a mountainous area near Deh Rawod in the southern part of the country when they hit the bomb. How effective they are against chemical attacks, their life spans, how they can stain your skin a deep black.</p> <p>They can tell you of Scud missile attacks, of Allied bombing runs on chemical stockpiles how the wind sometimes blew the remains of those stockpiles south and of a little mole on their son's side that one day turned a funny color.</p> <p>It foretold the young man's death. Cancer did what missiles and bullets in Desert Storm could not.</p> <p>Just before Christmas, 1 1/2 years after he noticed how the mole was lighter and different, 25-year-old Matthew Deppen was dead.</p> <p>His parents in Northumberland County wonder. They think of the Persian Gulf War, of the rumored chemical attacks, and they go through his letters again and again, searching for clues. They are trying to understand.</p> <p>"There is no doubt, no doubt in my mind that being over there caused his death," said his father, Gerald Deppen. "But how can I prove it? And what difference would it make?"</p>

Across the country, other parents are saying the same thing. As many as 2,000 Gulf War veterans are estimated to be suffering from illnesses that seemingly have no explanation.

Matthew Deppen was married to his high-school sweetheart and was the father of a 7-year-old boy. He was everything to his folks, a tough-minded kid, who, at 17, got his pilot's license, buzzing over their house as he put in his flight hours.

He flew an Apache helicopter for the Army. He survived seven months in the desert. He took part in the last great battle of the war, helping to destroy more than 200 pieces of armor. The desert blazed like hell that day.

"He did all of this, and how do they treat him?" asked his mother, Joette Deppen. "It's not fair. I just wish they would come out and say chemicals were used. I don't understand what they are hiding. Why . . . why do they always do this?"

-- Distrust of government

Desert Storm was not supposed to be another Vietnam, but it has become one in this way:

Veterans are getting sick. And no one seems to know why.

Hundreds who served are complaining of illnesses ranging from cancer to a little-understood malady dubbed "Gulf War Syndrome," which includes symptoms such as fatigue, a rash of open sores, irritability and depression.

Vietnam veterans suffered from maladies they claimed were caused by Agent Orange, which was used to clear jungle. It took years for the government to react.

A portion of the ill Gulf veterans say they are victims of chemical or biological attacks, though the military still says there is little evidence that they took place.

Not everyone thinks that's true. It was reported, for instance, that both Czechoslovakian and French troops noticed small levels of chemical-warfare agents during the war.

After the war, several U.S. servicemen said they had come under a chemical attack at one point during battle but were told to keep it quiet.

The Deppens say their son was in charge of maintaining gear that measured chemicals in the air where he was stationed.

One day, he noticed a high reading. He told his parents that his supervisor told him to ignore it, that the machine was not working.

Evidently, Matthew later questioned how he contracted cancer. Just weeks before he died, he told his parents: "Love your country, fear your government."

His wife, Kelly, reached at her Savannah, Ga., home, declined to comment.

The Army wouldn't speculate on what may have happened to Matthew Deppen, who suffered from melanoma, which is skin cancer.

Peter Esker, a spokesman for the Army Surgeon General, said there were a host of variables at play. Did soldiers who are sick have pre-existing conditions? How much exposure, if any, did they suffer?

He said the military is moving aggressively to pinpoint the problems. The Veterans Administration is cataloging cases and treating veterans, he said, and top military officials have taken part in fact-finding missions overseas, to determine whether service personnel were exposed.

"We are not treating this lightly," Esker said. "I understand the parents' anxiety. Their son is dead. And the mystery goes on."

The Deppens aren't so sure about the effort. They point to the government's use of Agent Orange in Vietnam and to the radiation experiments that were performed on civilians in the 1940s.

"This didn't just happen to our son," Gerald Deppen said. "You wait and see. There will be more."

-- Need for peace of mind

The Deppens click on their TV set, settle into their easy chairs and watch their son at war. It's a videotape of his final battle, the view coming from the cockpit of his Apache helicopter.

Over static, you hear his voice: "Another missile, please."

Later, he is shown being interviewed on CNN, standing tall and strong, his blond hair cropped short. He smiles.

The Deppens hold back tears. They are rock-solid people, loyal, but they are troubled.

With the success of this war so lightning fast, so clean and efficient so many had thought that the military had righted itself and erased the nightmare that was Vietnam.

The Deppens might argue with that. They gave the military their son, and it couldn't even bury him right. The honor guard from Fort Indiantown Gap got lost on its way to the cemetery in Lykens, and he never received a 21-gun salute.

"We're just looking for peace of mind," Joette Deppen said. "It's so frustrating."

Their son never had any history of cancer. He was the picture of health. The mole was tiny, a speck on his side, something we all have, probably.

"It was the size of a dot," Gerald Deppen said.

Now, they're left to show photographs of their son. There he stands with his wife, his baby. There is one of them on the beach, all smiling.

They talk of the time he made his solo flight, getting stranded in Binghamton, N.Y., because of snow. His parents offered to come get him, but he refused because it would have cost him his license. He camped in the airport for two

	<p>days.</p> <p>They speak of his maturity, getting married at 18. They recall his optimism, even when facing death.</p> <p>"He didn't want anyone feeling sorry for him," his mother said. "That's just the way he was."</p> <p>-- Loss in peacetime hard</p> <p>Matthew called his parents the day he found out about the disease. "Mom, are you sitting down?" he asked.</p> <p>Joette Deppen, not knowing how serious his condition was, looked up the cancer in the encyclopedia and gasped.</p> <p>"When you are told your son has cancer, you go numb," she said. "An emptiness comes over you."</p> <p>The thought of losing their son was so real during war; now it made no sense. He was home, safe, living in Savannah with his wife and son. Everything was the way it was supposed to be.</p> <p>He would live for only about a year and a half. He had the most serious form of the disease, which had burrowed through the layers of his skin and gone into the bloodstream.</p> <p>The news got worse around Christmas of 1992. He had felt a lump under his arm and had to have his lymph nodes removed. Cancer was discovered there, too.</p> <p>Early last month, he became bedridden for a time. The Deppens went to see him in Savannah. They helped the young family get a Christmas tree. Matthew wanted shrimp cooked in beer, one of his favorites.</p> <p>Gerald Deppen was supposed to return in a couple of weeks and bring his grandson back to Pennsylvania, but that didn't happen. to others were recalled vividly at a memorial service yesterday.

More than 500 people packed the Wesley United Methodist Church to bid farewell to the 29-year-old Concord man, who is presumed dead along with seven other servicemen following the crash Monday of two Huey helicopters in the pre-dawn darkness over the North Arabian Sea.

None of the bodies have been recovered and the search for them has been called off.

The tragedy brought home to New Hampshire the reality of the Middle East conflict, as those who knew Dillon reeled in shock.

"This is a coming home," Pastor Darrell K. Huddleston said to the gathering. In his eulogy, Dillon's oldest brother, Tom, said the words "fun, generous, enthusiastic, competitive, crazy, loved, loving, caring, dedicated, courageous, brave, loyal, a Marine," fit him well.

"To me, Gary was full of life, and that is the paradox today," he said.

Dillon was last in New Hampshire in June, when he visited his parents' home on the shores of Lake Winnepesaukee to participate in the wedding of his brother, Mike, and announced his plans to marry, his father, Glen, said yesterday.

Gary and Kasia Weglarz, of Lynn, Mass., had not yet set a wedding date, but he was due home in December, his father said.

Dillon was deployed aboard the U.S.S. Okinawa in June and was sent to the Philippines. In August, after Iraq's Saddam Hussein invaded Kuwait, the Okinawa was diverted to the Persian Gulf as part of Operation Desert Shield.

He had written Kasia's brother, Stephen, that the night practice missions were "pretty intense." But it was that exhilarating aspect of living on the edge which drew him to fly helicopters for the Marines, said college friend Mark McIntyre.

"He loved to move fast, he loved the excitement," McIntyre said. "I think he was one heck of a soldier for that reason."

Dillon was piloting one of the two helicopters when the Okinawa lost contact with both Monday at about 5 a.m., Saudi Arabian time, leading officials to believe the two collided. USMC Capt. Michael Banning said only parts of the fuselage of both aircraft were recovered.

Dillon is believed to have been wearing special night goggles, which critics claim can reduce peripheral vision. The Army said it has limited night maneuvers in Operation Desert Shield pending completion of an investigation into the Monday incident.

Dillon was the third of four sons of Glen and Patsy Dillon, who recently moved from Concord to Laconia. Glen Dillon is vice president of Universal Packaging Corp. in Bow. Dillon was an outstanding athlete in football and basketball at Concord High School and was graduated in 1978.

He attended a postgraduate year at Kimball Union Academy in Plainfield and then went to the University of New Hampshire in Durham, where he was graduated in 1983 with a degree in business. While at UNH, he played football

Donnelly, 46, died after a relentless ten-year battle with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), also known as Lou Gehrig's disease. His loved ones were at his side at the time of his death.</p> <p>Before retiring with military honors in 1996, Major Donnelly, a dedicated career fighter pilot, served his nation proudly. Over the course of his 15-year career, he flew first the A-10 Warthog and then the F-16 Falcon. During Operation Desert Storm he completed 44 F-16 combat missions over Iraq as a member of the 10th Tactical Fighter Squadron stationed at Hahn Air Force Base in Germany. At the time of his retirement, he was serving as Chief of</p>

Standardization and Evaluation while assigned to the 80th

Flying Training Wing at Sheppard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls, Texas. Upon his retirement, Major Donnelly received the Meritorious Service Medal for outstanding service to the United States. In this role, Major Donnelly trained NATO fighter pilots from over 16 countries and developed entirely new flying operations for the largest flying training wing in the world. His many other honors included the Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters, the Aerial Achievement Medal, the Air Force Commendation Medal with four oak leaf clusters, the Air Force Achievement Medal and the Top Gun award. Diagnosed with ALS in 1996, Major Donnelly spent the next nine and a half years in the service of his fellow gulf war veterans, thousands of whom are suffering from a host of debilitating and life-threatening illnesses brought about by exposure to nerve agents and other toxins, spent depleted uranium munitions and experimental vaccines. In 1998, Major Donnelly published a book, "Falcon's Cry: A Desert Storm Memoir," that chronicled his struggle. Untiring in his labors, he testified before Congress, appeared on numerous television and radio news and talk shows and granted interviews to countless newspapers and magazines for as long as his faculties allowed and even after they no longer did. Notably, he appeared on the Larry King Show, gained coverage for his cause in the Hartford Courant, the New York Times, the Washington Times, the Boston Globe, People, the Journal Inquirer and many other news outlets large and small in the United States and Europe. After six years of courageous and impassioned effort, and while suffering greatly from the progression of his own illness, Major Donnelly was the prime mover behind the government's acknowledgement of the connection between service in Operation Desert Storm and the elevated incidence of ALS. As a result, scores of gulf war veterans suffering from ALS were immediately granted retroactive service-connection status, which resulted

in the payment of the veterans' benefits they earned when they served their country. In addition, his efforts led directly to the release of millions of dollars in federal research money to support the study of ALS incidence among gulf war veterans. Major Donnelly received a BA in history from Fairfield University in 1981 and an MBA from Midwestern University in 1995. In 2003, Fairfield University bestowed an honorary Juris Doctor degree upon him for his selfless service to his nation and to others. A warrior until the end, Major Donnelly never surrendered to the relentless progression of the degenerative disease that ended his life. Everyone who ever met him, whether hardened reporter or dear friend, fellow veteran, caretaker or politician, remarked upon his incredible grace and courage in the face of a terrible and invariably fatal illness.

He had an infectious, crooked smile, a disarming wit and the dancing, mischievous blue eyes of an Irish charmer. Major Donnelly touched many, many hearts throughout his short life, but especially since his diagnosis with ALS. He will be greatly missed by all.

He leaves a wife, Susan Allen Donnelly, and two children, Erin, 18, and Sean, 13, and his parents, Rae and Thomas Donnelly, all of South Windsor. <p>Dugan, Donald</p>	<p>Dugan, Donald</p> <p><b>FAMILY OF U.S. SOLDIER KILLED IN BOSNIA FONDLY REMEMBER 'DONNIE'</b></p> <p>The last time Lisa Dugan talked to her father before he left for a peacekeeping mission in Bosnia, she had good news for him.</p> <p>"I told him he was going to be a grandfather," Miss Dugan recalled of that late-December conversation.</p> <p>But Sgt. 1st Class Donald Dugan - the first U.S. soldier to die in action since the mission in Bosnia began - will never see his first grandchild.</p> <p>The 38-year-old native of nearby Belle Center was killed Saturday in northern Bosnia when he apparently stepped on a land mine. He is the ninth alliance soldier to die since NATO began deploying troops to the Balkans in December.</p> <p>He joined the Army in 1978 and became a career military man, serving as a recruiter and drill sergeant at bases throughout the world. He was sent to Bosnia in December.</p> <p>Sunday, family members here in north-central Ohio fondly remembered the man they called "Donnie" as a strong-willed person who wanted to succeed in the service.</p> <p>"He was a super guy," said his ex-wife, Betty Dugan, 37. "He was out to serve his county and that's what he did."</p>

Sgt. Dugan's two children, Lisa, 19, and Donald, 15, Sunday were mourning the loss of a father they hardly ever saw, but one whom they always thought would return home.

His mother, Patrice Dugan, who lives south of Kenton, Ohio, was mourning the loss of her youngest son, who also is the first of her six children to die.

Sgt. Dugan had served in Operation Desert Storm in 1991 and was expected to retire from the U.S. Army in two years. He thrived on moving up in the Army ranks, his ex-wife said. He also seemed invincible to many of his family members.

"I always thought he would come back," his daughter said, wiping away tears.

His son and namesake, though, wouldn't say much. He just shook his head.

Sgt. Dugan's children were getting through the rough afternoon with pictures and memories of their father, including tales about his three-week visit to Ohio in June. While he was here, they went to an amusement park, took the boat out on nearby Indian Lake, and played pool.

They also wrote frequently to their father, who had been living in Germany with his wife, Miriam.

Betty Dugan, who was married to her high-school sweetheart for eight years, said she was attracted to Dugan for his sense of drive and passion to achieve.

With a strong build and dark hair and eyes, he was an athlete and honors student at Ridgemoor High School in Ridgeway, Ohio. He grew up on a farm, where he worked in the fields to help raise dairy cows and hogs.

He left high school for Ohio Northern University in Ada, where he had aspirations of majoring in pre-law. A year later, he decided to enter the service.

"One day, he said he enlisted in the Army," Ms. Dugan said. "I was all for it. That's what he wanted."

But family members Sunday were having serious regrets about what had happened to Sgt. Dugan.

"I'm just mad. I don't understand why," his daughter said.

She also said she had plans to call President Clinton for an explanation on why her father was killed in a peacekeeping mission.

His ex-wife, meanwhile, was surprised this type of accident could happen to him.

"I worried when he went to Desert Storm, and now when he went to Bosnia," she said. "I just can't believe this. I always thought he was so careful."

According to U.S. Army officials, Dugan was manning an isolated checkpoint near what had been the front line separating Serb and combined Muslim-Croat forces. It appeared to be in an area that was supposed to have been cleared of mines by the factions responsible for laying them and then cleared again by

Mr. Dugan's dedication to veterans affairs began after his tour of duty in Vietnam where he received several awards for valor. His 17-year active and reserve military career also carried him to the Persian Gulf war in 1990 where he served as a staff sergeant.

KDKA-TV reporter and former Marine Cpl. Ross Guidotti served with Mr. Dugan in the Persian Gulf and the two remained friends since.

"He could rage at you, and then a couple of minutes later, he'd be fine," Guidotti said. "He had a tremendous influence on young Marines. A lot of men looked to Joe for leadership. Joe had been there."

After a brief stint in law enforcement, Mr. Dugan joined the Pittsburgh Fire Department and served on the Pittsburgh Firefighters Local No. 1 executive board until he retired to take the Soldiers & Sailors position.

"He was really focused on those who continued to serve in the fire bureau," said union president Joe King. "There was no compromising when it came to veterans affairs."

Mr. Dugan married Kathy Perkins in 1988. She said he was an ideal husband and father.

This past fall, Mr. Dugan made more than 200 meatballs for a fundraiser for St. Mary of the Mount school, where his children attend.

"He was so involved with school activities," Mrs. Dugan said. "He was never afraid to pitch in to help. Joe had so many friends -- from the 2-year-old down the street to the 95-year-old veteran."

Mr. Dugan graduated from Taylor Allderdice High School in Squirrel Hill before serving in Vietnam.

"He was dedicated to the service of this country," Mrs. Dugan said.

After working as a U.S. Capitol police officer after the war, Mr. Dugan later moved to Dade County, Fla., where he worked as a motorcycle policeman before returning to Pittsburgh to become an Allegheny County homicide detective.

He is survived by his wife, Kathy Ann (Perkins) Dugan; a daughter, Meghan, at home; sons Ben and Bobby Dugan at home, and Joseph Dugan III, of Pittsburgh; his mother Mary Torcaso, of Greenfield; a sister, Marianna Knapp, and husband, Paul, of Greenfield; a brother Joseph Torcaso, and wife, Kim, of Greenfield; and several nieces and nephews.
