<p>Gagarin, Greg P.</p>	<p>Army Staff Sgt. Greg P.Gagarin, 38, was killed June 3 in Thania, Iraq, after an improvised bomb exploded near his vehicle</p> <p>Greg P. Gagarin may have been raised in Los Angeles, but he never forgot his Filipino roots. He was planning to retire on his military pension in several years and build a home in the Philippines, where he and his wife could raise their two children, relatives say.</p> <p>"He valued his family and always wanted to do what was best for them," his sister Aileen Gagarin said in a telephone interview last week from the Philippines.</p> <p>She and other family members had returned to the island nation to bury Gagarin in his birthplace, Candon City, a town that sits on the South China Sea.</p> <p>A 19-year Army veteran, Gagarin served in Operation Desert Storm in 1991 and was on his third tour of duty in Iraq when killed. He was a member of the 1st Battalion, 37th Field Artillery Regiment, 3rd Brigade, which was assigned to Ft. Lewis, Wash.</p> <p>"He had a love for serving," said his brother Melvin Gagarin. "That was his passion."</p> <p>Greg Gagarin came to Los Angeles in 1981 and settled with his family near Los Feliz. Family members said he enjoyed Griffith Park, where he would golf and play football with friends.</p> <p>Once Gagarin set his mind on something, he was determined to see it through, his brother said. He remembered Gagarin, only 12 at the time, carrying a Christmas tree over his shoulder for about half a mile from a grocery store to the family's home.</p> <p>"Mom wanted a Christmas tree," Melvin Gagarin said. "We didn't have a car."</p> <p>Gagarin attended John Marshall High School and decided in his senior year to join the Army. It was not a surprising choice, family members say.</p> <p>"His career took off from there," Melvin Gagarin said.</p> <p>Aileen Gagarin said some of her fondest memories of her brother were when he would arrive at the family home unannounced, decked out in his crisp military uniform.</p>

	<p>"I would feel really proud of him," she said. "Those would be good surprises for me." he said she understood his calling to serve in the military. But she was uncomfortable when he went back to Iraq a third time.</p> <p>"Honestly, I felt it was a little unfair because he had been on previous tours," his sister said. "He was putting himself in the middle of it again."</p> <p>The last time she heard from him, she said, was when she received an e-mail in March. He told her of his plans to retire. "He loved the Philippines," she said.</p> <p>Gagarin was buried Wednesday. <p>Galloway, David E.</p>	<p>Staff Sgt. David E. Galloway of Oregon City, among the six Marines and a sailor killed when their helicopter crashed in the Pacific, was remembered Friday as a warm and gentle family man who was dedicated to his military career.</p> <p>"David was a Marine through and through," said his father, David R.E. Galloway. "This kid had his act together from word go. I can't tell you how much he'll be missed."</p> <p>Galloway, 28, was married and had three young children. He had recently received a promotion to staff sergeant as a member of a Marine reconnaissance unit, his father said. He specialized in explosives, weapons, counter-terrorism and counter-insurgency.</p> <p>Darcy Richardson, one of Galloway's two sisters, said she and her brother were very close while students at Oregon City High School. He graduated in 1989; she graduated a year later.</p> <p>Her brother was a leading member of an Oregon City speed roller-skating team during the mid-1980s, said Richardson of Gladstone.</p> <p>"He was a great dad and the type of person who was a good friend to everybody," Richardson said. "He was always into being in good shape. He was really into biking, and, even now, he has a car but prefers to travel by bike. He said it helps keep him in shape for his job."</p> <p>Richardson said she frequently would chat with her brother over the Internet. They last chatted less than a week ago while he was on leave from his base at Camp Pendleton near San Diego.</p> <p>"We were making plans for his boys and our boys getting together at Disneyland this summer," she said. "When he came home for visits, he always said he really wanted to make something out of his life."</p> <p>Galloway was a highly decorated Marine and had served with distinction during Operation Desert Storm and in Somalia, his father said. In Somalia, he had received a commendation for taking out two snipers.</p>

	<p>The CH-46 Sea Knight helicopter went down Thursday afternoon about 15 miles off San Diego during a training exercise that involved flying from one ship to another.</p> <p>Galloway's father called his son "a quiet but determined guy, who really had his life in order."</p> <p>His sister said he originally wanted to be a Navy Seal but had difficulty getting into the program and decided to join the Marines nine years ago. His job frequently brought him into cooperative operations with Navy Seal units, she said.</p> <p>"He really wanted to be successful," she said. "I think once he got into the Marine Corps, he realized that he really enjoyed what he was doing."</p> <p>In addition to his father and sister, Galloway is survived by his wife, Holly, of Oceanside, Calif.; sons, Fred, 18 months, Billy, 5, and Stetson, 6, all of Oceanside; another sister, Denise Lorraine Garcia of Newport; and stepbrother, Fred Von Seggern of Redmond.</p> <p>Funeral arrangements are pending. David R.E. Galloway said that he would like to have his son buried in Willamette National Cemetery in Portland next to his mother, Dorothy J. The Department of Defense said yesterday that Goodwin was killed by enemy small-arms fire while fighting near the town of Al Qaim in Anbar prov-ince. He was assigned to the 2nd Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division out of Camp Lejeune, N.C., known as The Warlords.</p> <p>Goodwin was a married father of two who lived with his wife in North Carolina. He was born in Massachusetts, but spent most of his life in San Antonio, Texas, his father said. Cheney, speaking at his house on Holly Avenue, said his oldest son lived in Mount Holly for about 18 months in the late 1980s before enlisting. 	<p>lines." "Not everybody has the opportunity to die in that fashion," Cheney said. "He was doing what he loved. He believed the people over there needed their liberation."</p> <p>Edwards said Goodwin's service record dates to September 1989. He served tours in Desert Shield and Desert Storm in Kuwait, as well as in Angola and the Balkans. Along the way, he amassed 31 decorations, commendations and citations.
