Mathews, Theodore S. Sr.	<p>Retired Col. Theodore S. Mathews Sr. of Williamsburg, Va., died June 28, 2006, after a long battle with cancer.</p> <p>Col. Mathews was born on Feb. 27, 1930, in Lockport, N.Y. He was the son of Stephen and Katherine Mathews who preceded him in death.</p> <p>He graduated from Lockport High School in 1948 and was attending the University of Buffalo when the Korean War broke out.</p> <p>He enlisted in the United States Navy in 1950 and completed the Navy's Aviation Electronics Technician School. He was then assigned to Patrol Bomber Squadron VP-25 based out of NAS Barbers Point, Hawaii, which flew the Navy's version of the B-24 Liberator called the "Privateer." He quickly advanced from radar technician to radar operator and crewman of one of the B-24 aircraft. In February</p>

1952, 10 days before the squadron deployed to Korea, he received orders to NAS Pensacola and entered the Naval Aviation Cadet Training program. During primary flight training he learned that his old squadron lost three aircraft in Korea, one of which was his and all hands were lost.

He completed primary flight training and became carrier qualified in March of 1953. In September of 1953, he completed advanced training at NAS Corpus Christi, Texas, and was qualified in the Douglas AD Skyraider aircraft or as the Air Force called them: "A1's/A1E's," "Spads," or "Sandys." He was then commissioned as an Ensign and received his "Navy Wings of Gold."

Col. Mathews was then assigned to Composite Squadron-35 (VC-35) at NAS North Island, Coronado, Calif. Flying the Skyraider, VC-35 was an all-weather, night attack, special weapons squadron that deployed in teams of five pilots and four aircraft to each carrier group in the Pacific. VC-35 pilots were specially trained to deliver the Atomic bomb from the carrier group if need be. He sailed on the carrier USS Wasp, CVA-18 with VAN Team 31, Air Task Group One, and Task Force 77 from June 1954 to April 1955. Action included the air coverage of the evacuation of the Tachen Islands North of Formosa. Weather conditions were so poor during the evacuation, his team and sister team from VC-11 were the only ones who flew air cover for four and a half of the ten days required to complete the evacuation. These two teams made up the "Hunter-Killer" team of the carrier group.

As an Ensign in VC-35, Col. Mathews flew 122.2 hours in one month, all single engine and single pilot, which was an unbroken squadron record. He also broke 1000 hours of flying time before making the rank of Lieutenant, Junior Grade.

In February 1956, Col. Mathews returned home to complete his undergraduate studies at the University of Buffalo where he received his BA degree.

While at the University, he joined the U.S. Navy Reserves at NAS Niagara Falls, N.Y., where he transitioned into jet fighters in addition to remaining current in propeller aircraft. When NAS Niagara Falls was closed in 1958, he walked across the runway and joined the 136th Tactical Fighter Squadron, New York Air National Guard where he flew the F-86H Sabre. He was now a rated pilot in two military services. As a pilot, Col. Mathews flew aircraft as the SNJ, SNB, T-34, all seven models of the AD Skyraider, T-33 (T-Bird), F2H Banshees, FJ Furys, and the F-86H Sabre. He was transitioning into the F-100 Super Sabre when he entered medical school.

Following graduation from New York Medical College in 1965, he returned to active duty in the Air Force and completed his internship and residency training in General Surgery at the Wilford Hall USAF Medical Center in San Antonio, Texas. As a physician, he has served as Director of Base Medical Services at Brooks AFB, San Antonio, Texas, Chief of General Surgery at RAF Lakenheath, England, Chief of Hospital Services and Surgical Services at Incirlik AB, Turkey, and two tours at the Air Force Academy Hospital, Colorado Springs, Colo. He became Chief, Hospital Services, United States Air Force Academy Hospital in July 1991.

During the Vietnam War, he served a term at the Burn Unit, Brook Army Medical Center, Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas. During the Gulf War, Col. Mathews served at Riyadh AB, Saudi Arabia, where he was appointed Commander of the 56th Air Transportation Hospital. During Operation Desert Storm he had his 61st birthday making him one of the oldest active duty

May, Richard	<p>The decorated police officer and Orcutt resident shot to death Saturday while on patrol for the East Palo Alto Police Department will be honored Thursday during a noon memorial service at the H.P. Pavilion in San Jose.</p>

Throng of police officers, public officials, friends and family are expected at the event honoring Officer Richard May, the 38-year-old married father of three daughters who commuted to his job in the Bay Area city. Details of a Central Coast memorial service reportedly will be finalized today.

May's friends and family were reeling Monday from his death.

The officer's father, Richard May Sr., said his son had aspirations to be a police chief and wished to cut his teeth in gritty East Palo Alto when he took the job there 18 months ago. May stayed with his mother and stepfather while on-duty, then led a happy domestic life in Orcutt when off, his father said.

After graduating in 1985 from San Luis Obispo High School,

May spent a transformative seven years in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserves. He served overseas in 1991 during Operation Desert Storm.

"In high school, he was a nice kid like everybody else," Richard May Sr. said of his son. "When he came out of the Marine Corps he was a proud, upstanding person."

May also thrived as an officer in the Lompoc Police Department. During his 15-year career in Lompoc, he distinguished himself for his work with juveniles, working as a D.A.R.E. officer and founding a police activities league, said Lompoc Police Sgt. Mike Collins. Officers at that department wore black bands across their badges Monday to recognize May.

"He was hardworking and liked to help the community," Collins said.

May in 1994 received the prestigious H. Thomas Guerry Award from the Santa Barbara Citizens Council on Crime for his role in saving the life of a victim suffering from cardiac arrest. In 1997 he was honored with the Distinguished Service Award from the Santa Barbara County Probation Department for his work with juveniles.

But the officer was at his best when spending time with his three daughters, ages 9, 13 and 17, Richard May Sr. said.

"That's how I remember him," the man said. "Smiling with his kids."

That sentiment was echoed by neighbor and friend Marcy Simms, who remembers May playing soccer or throwing catch with his daughters. He also helped coach his youngest daughter's soccer and softball teams.

"He was just a great family guy who loved his kids so much," Simms said. "He loved being a police officer and he died doing what he loved. He's a hero in anyone's book."

May was shot about 5 p.m. Saturday after responding to a disturbance at the Villa Taqueria off University Avenue in Palo Alto, police said. The officer approached 23-year-old known gang member Alberto Alvarez, who was walking away from the business. Alvarez turned around and opened fire on May, then tried to scale a fence and escape, police said. When he could not climb the fence, Alvarez returned to May and fatally shot him, according to police.

Alvarez was arrested Sunday on suspicion of killing May. He is being held

III "Bugzy"</p>	<p>Marine used his training to help troubled youths</p> <p>By Marsha Forys TRIBUNE-REVIEW Monday, March 14, 2005</p> <p>With more than 22 years in the United States Marine Corps, James W. "Bugzy" Morgan III was a Marine's Marine.</p> <p>So when he retired as a master sergeant in 1994, and moved back to his native western Pennsylvania, it was at first a difficult transition.</p> <p>"We had moved every two or three years while he was in the service," said his wife, Diane, noting the family had been stationed at bases in South Carolina, California, Maryland, Washington, D.C., and other U.S. locations.</p> <p>As a drill sergeant, Mr. Morgan spent three years in the Middle East training soldiers during the Gulf War, and he was also stationed for two years in Plymouth, England, as a result of being chosen for the British Royal Marine exchange program.</p> <p>"He wanted to retire before he was 40, and he did, but he really missed it," said Diane Morgan.</p>

Then, along came a job that seemed just perfect for the tough, but compassionate, ex-Marine. He became a wilderness instructor at the Outside-IN school for wayward, adjudicated youths.

Diane Morgan explained that her husband and other school staffers would take groups of eight boys on three-week trips to wilderness areas all across the country and to Canada.

During that time, the youths would complete community service projects such as clearing trails, all the while learning that they had to take responsibility for their own actions.

"He loved it," Diane Morgan said. "He got to hike, climb, camp. He used to joke he couldn't believe he got paid to do this."

But then in 2003 came the terrible news. Bugzy, as he was called by almost all who knew him, a man who had been in excellent physical condition all his life, learned he had a brain tumor.

He was told he had just 12 weeks to live, Diane Morgan said, but he kept on working until the debilitating effects of the tumor no longer allowed him to. In November 2003, his wife had to pick him up at work and take him to the hospital. That was his last day at the school.

"He kept telling everyone he was going to beat this, and he couldn't wait to get back to work," Diane Morgan said.

Unfortunately that didn't happen. But, despite losing his sight and his ability to read and write, Morgan was able to complete, with the help of his family, one last task before his death.

He dictated a manual on how to use a Global Positioning Satellite system. He hoped it would help wilderness instructors, Boy Scout leaders and others.

The final draft was sent to the publisher just 10 days before his death.

Diane Morgan said his husband's work with troubled youths also made him a better father.

"He had always strived to be the best in everything he did," she said. "He expected a lot from our kids, and was hard on them. I think by working with these boys, he realized how wonderful his own children were."

In fact, Morgan said the couple's four children are following in their father's footsteps, working with other children as teachers and coaches.

"He taught them that it's not enough to be just part of the community. You have to give back, and that's what they are doing," Diane Morgan said.

Jim Cardillo, Mr. Morgan's cousin, friend and fellow Marine, spoke eloquently of his pal.

"His quiet, peaceful and relaxed demeanor presented the profile of a person full of confidence and purpose. But behind this exterior was a man who stood in the presence of presidents, diplomats and world leaders, a man who traveled

Mullin, Jeffrey	<p>FAMILY, FRIENDS MOURN DESERT SHIELD SOLDIER WEYMOUTH -- In a snow-covered corner of his native New England, Army Sgt. Jeffrey Mullin was buried yesterday with full military honors far from the heat of the Saudi Arabian desert, where he died at the age of 24 two days before the outbreak of war with Iraq.</p>

His grief-stricken wife, Maria Guadalupe (Saucedo) Mullin, a slim young woman in black, accepted one of three American flags presented to family members by a contingent of soldiers who served as pallbearers and as honor guard at graveside services at Village Cemetery.

Other flags were presented to Sgt. Mullin's mother, D. Joanne (Balfe) Mullin-Blanchard of Kingston and his father, James F. Mullin Sr. of Pembroke. Sgt. Mullin was the 105th American killed in the Middle East as America prepared for war.

At the cemetery, a 21-gun salute was fired as a large group of family and friends stood weeping beside Sgt. Mullin's flag-draped casket. In the distance, a bugler played taps. The silence was broken only by sobs and the cold wind rustling the large fir trees near the grave.

A 1985 graduate of Weymouth South High School, Sgt. Mullin had been in the Army for six years, three of them in Germany. He was shipped to Saudi Arabia soon after Iraq invaded Kuwait on Aug. 2 and his wife returned to her home in Juarez, Mexico.

In Saudia Arabia, Sgt. Mullin was assigned to tank duty with E Troop, 2d Battalion, Armored Cavalry Regiment. A member of Sgt. Mullin's family said yesterday the sergeant was found dead inside his tank following maneuvers. He said the family is awaiting results of an autopsy "Lupe" Mullin had met her husband while he was stationed at Fort Bliss in El Paso, Texas. Accompanied by her sister, she flew here for the funeral from Mexico with the infant daughter Sgt. Mullin had never seen. A photograph of 2-month-old Karla was buried with him.

At St. Francis Xavier Church, where the funeral Mass was said at 10 a.m. yesterday, the gospel was read in both English and Spanish in deference to Mrs. Mullin.

The selection, from St. Luke, tells of two of Jesus' disciples travelling to Emmaus after the crucifixion, bitter and disillusioned at the loss of their leader. On the road they meet a man who reveals himself as the resurrected Christ, shares the Eucharist with them and reassures them that he has risen, restoring their faith. The gospel was read in Spanish by Rev. Michael Kossack, chaplain at South Shore Hospital, and in English by church deacon Joseph Vitello of Weymouth.

In his eulogy, Rev. Lawrence Drennan of St. Joseph's Parish in Lincoln, formerly of St. Francis, drew a parallel to the mood in the United States today .

He said, "These two guys on that road were like us. They thought they had backed a loser. They were angry and depressed and had ambivalent feelings, as many Americans these days."

"So what did Jesus say? Jesus said: What are you worried about? Can't you see that I am risen?"

"There are some today who will say that America is on the road to Emmaus. Jeffrey's road to Emmaus took him out into the desert, but even the desert is a place of hope. Let us now begin again to heal one another even though we tremble inside.

	<p>"Let us be confident that God is with us in these days. To Lupe, let me translate a message a Spanish woman asked me to give her: 'It's going to be alright. God is with us. May Jeffrey rest in peace and may he be a sign of hope for each of us. May his child, Karla, be for his family and for us the spirit of eternal life.' "</p> <p>Father Drennan spoke of the importance "of coming together to ritualize our grief. If God is for us in moments like this, who can be against us even though we tremble inside? So, we have to say goodbye to a young man and we thank God for the gift of the liturgy that comforts us in these painful times when we must say goodbye." To Lupe Mullin, he said in Spanish, "We care for you. We share your suffering. Things will resolve. Remember that God is first."</p> <p>The church was filled to capacity with mourners, many of them young people from among Sgt. Mullin's large family and friends, and a contingent of Weymouth police, colleagues of James F. Mullin Jr., one of Sgt. Mullin's three brothers, who is on the force. Four priests concelebrated the Mass. At the request of the Mullin family, "Be Not Afraid" and "God is Walking Beside Me" were played by church organist Ann Marie Read of Weymouth, along with the hauntingly beautiful, "On Eagles' Wings." As the young soldier's casket, now flag-draped, was borne from the church, "America the Beautiful" was played on both the organ and on the church chimes.</p> <p>In the end, as mourners moved reluctantly away from his grey steel casket, Sgt. Mullin's mother placed a single red rose on it, next to a bouquet of red- and-white chrysanthemums left by his widow.</p> <p>"In normal circumstances," Father Drennan said, "children are supposed to go to the cemetery to bury their parents. In wartime, we go to bury our children." What he feared, Father Drennan said, was that Sgt.
